The Anthropology of Food and Nutrition (Fall 2020)

Nutritional anthropology is the study of the interplay between human biology, economic systems, nutritional status and food security. If economic and environmental changes in a community affect access to food, food security, and dietary health, then this interplay between culture and biology is in turn connected to broader historical and economic trends associated with globalization.

Society for the Anthropology of Food and Nutrition ...

The Anthropology of Food is an analysis of food in culture. While the primary purpose for food is nutrition, it also has a cultural dimension by which people choose what they eat not only by flavor or nutritional value but by cultural, religious, historic, economic or social status, and environmental factors.

Food is fundamental to life, is it animal physiology, and nutrition is affected by cultural perceptions. The goal of this course is to challenge you to think critically about food, health, and nutrition. In other words, to explore these topics from an anthropologic (biological and cultural) and scientific (method and hypothesis testing) approach.

ANTH 220: Introduction to Nutritional Anthropology

The early history of nutritional anthropology dates back to studies of food and social organization in non-industrial societies in the 1930s. The British anthropologist Audrey Richards (1939) is often described as the first one who explicitly focused on food. She studied economic and social factors affecting food among the Bemba in central Africa.

History of Nutritional Anthropology

From subsistence strategies, to nutrition, to the role of foodways in identity construction, to food security and sovereignty, food is THE story of the human condition. Anthropology offers a robust perspective on food that cuts across time and space.

Anthropology of Food and Nutrition: Linking the Subfields

In addition to anthropology graduate programs, there are also opportunities for graduate study in Food Studies. Food Studies programs are quite diverse and offer opportunities to study food and/or nutrition from a

Its multi-disciplinary nature adds to its complexity.
